



FY10 Budget and HUD Appropriations

Request for FY10 Budget Resolution:

- Adopt an FY10 budget resolution with discretionary spending at the level provided in the House-passed budget resolution, H. Res. 85.

Request for FY10 HUD Appropriations:

- Support adequate funding for all housing and community development programs in FY10, including:

Issue Summary:

In February, the President submitted his broad budget request to Congress for \$1.096 trillion in discretionary spending in FY10. Both the House and Senate passed budget resolutions in early April. The House's discretionary funding level is \$7 billion less than the President's, and the Senate's resolution is \$15 billion less than the President's. (over)



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After the House and Senate adopt the same budget resolution, appropriators will divide the discretionary spending amount among the various appropriations subcommittees with jurisdiction over the discretionary spending programs, including the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, and Related Agencies. It is important to have the largest discretionary number possible so as to accommodate needed increases in HUD funding. These subcommittee allocations are referred to as the 302b allocations.

The President's FY10 detailed budget request is expected in May. The White House's budget overview indicates the President will seek:

- \$4.5 billion for Community Development Block Grants
- \$1 billion to capitalize the National Housing Trust Fund
- Increased funding for the Housing Choice Voucher program
- Funding to renew project-based Section 8 contracts
- Enhanced enforcement of fair housing, mortgage disclosure and mortgage settlement requirements
- A new Energy Innovation Fund, "to encourage private sector investment in the energy efficiency of the nation's housing stock"
- A new Choice Neighborhoods Initiative, "to make a range of transformative investments in high-poverty neighborhoods where public and assisted housing is concentrated"

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
